Creating Kaleidoscopes using Adobe Photoshop

Before doing anything else, go to **Lloyd Williams'** website and download his templates, which he graciously allows you to download free of charge. http://lloydwphoto.com/downloads.htm

- 1. Select the image you wish to use for your Kaleidoscope in **Bridge**.
- 2. Open into Photoshop
- 3. If you wish to adjust it in Adobe Camera Raw, you may do so, but it is not critical.
- 4. Once the image is open in Photoshop
- 5. Go back to bridge and locate the Kaleidoscope templates you downloaded from Lloyd Willimas' website.
- 6. Open one of the templates into Photoshop: 4, 6 square, 6 hexagonal, 8, 10, 12 or 16
- 7. Then go back to the image you opened in step 4 above.
- 8. Press **Control A** or on Mac **Command A** to select the image. You will see a marquee surrounding your image.
- 9. Next press **Control C** or on Mac **Command C** to copy the image to the clipboard.
- 10. Now go back to the template you chose and resize it to the size of the image you want to create.

 *Note, the downloaded templates are low resolution and exceedingly small in size. You must change the DPI to 300 and size it accordingly.
 - a. Click on Image, Image Size and set the width, height, and resolution to your needs and click Ok.
 - b. Be sure the **Layers** panel is selected, so you may see the different slices.
 - c. Pick a random slice and double click it.
 - d. The slice will open. Hold the **Control** key or **Command** key on Mac and click the second layer underneath the first layer, so that both are selected. Be sure to click directly on the square and not next to it.
 - e. Next click Edit, Paste Special, Paste Into
 - f. Your image will appear in one of the slices.
 - g. Press Control T or Command T Mac to Transform
 - h. Press **Control** or **Command** (- this is a minus sign or a dash) to shrink the overall selection, so that you may see the selection handles.
 - i. Using the **Transform** arrow, you may move the image around inside the slice and you may enlarge or make the image smaller. <u>To rotate the slice, move the arrow to the corner of the handle and the arrow will change to a curved double headed arrow</u>, which will allow you to rotate the image.
 - j. On the toolbar, click the **Checkmark** to finish the process.
 - k. Click on File, Close and click Yes.
 - I. Your new Kaleidoscope will appear.
